Dear Wildwoods Friends and Family,

What a year we had in 2023! Thank YOU for being a part of it! Your support meant everything to the animals and humans alike who benefited from our work. We admitted 882 animals representing 119 species, and provided support to 2,484 people.

Our Work in 2023

Wildwoods has worked diligently to increase our funding sources and to create a sustainable organization. We are proud that in the last year we have:

- Introduced new foundations to our work, expanding this area of funding.
- **Increased the number of individual supporters**, lowered our attrition rate, and encouraged lapsed supporters to rejoin our efforts!
- Received our **first bequest** from a supporter's estate plan.

With this growing support, we continued to improve the care and housing for orphaned and injured wildlife.

- We built **new enclosures** in our outdoor pre-release conditioning area that meets the particular needs of the animal species we house.
- It appears Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza is here to stay, so we **expanded and upgraded our quarantine room** to improve care for raptors, waterfowl, and mammals that are susceptible to this disease.
- We started the process of upgrading our nursery, including prepping for raccoons, and building a new quarantine room for waterfowl babies.

2023 Stats

Animals Served

In 2023, we admitted 882 animal patients from 119 species. The eastern cottontail rabbit topped the list (165) for mammals, followed by the eastern gray squirrel (59). The top two bird species were rock pigeons (74) and American robins (38). Most common raptors were the bald eagle (16) and the broad-winged hawk (15). See page 4 for a complete species list!



People Served

Wildwoods served 2,484 people in 2023:

- 722 people brought in animals for care.
- 1,463 people called with animal concerns and questions, with most calls resulting in the animal being left safely in place.
- 299 people participated in our educational programs.
- We had four tabling events reaching large audiences.

Our New Outdoor Pre-release Conditioning Area



Our new outdoor pre-release conditioning area for the animals is ready to go! This \$40,000 capital project took us almost two years to complete, and we could not be more pleased with the outcome.

Orphaned animals that are raised in captivity need to have the space and the time to exercise their muscles so that, upon release, they have the physical ability and endurance necessary for their survival. They also need to learn how to hunt and forage before release. Injured animals that have completed the healing process need this period of acclimation to regain their muscle mass and endurance.

The animals need caging styles, sizes, and shapes specific to their species that promote their natural behaviors, and appropriate substrate for their feet or for burrowing. If the cages are too small, they do not have the space that they need to get the muscle mass and endurance required (e.g., aerial dives for insectivores), and they will not have adequate experience foraging and hunting. Our caging size, structure, and substrate comply with the Standards for Wildlife Rehabilitation set forth by the National Wildlife Rehabilitation Association and the International Wildlife Rehabilitation Council.

The cages were designed and built by an all-volunteer force.

Keeping Wildlife Wild

We take in orphaned babies as a last resort. When we receive a call, our first effort is always to try to reunite the babies with their parents; their best chance at life is to be raised by their own species.



In July 2023, we received a call about a nest of robins whose tree had been cut down. The finder sent us photos of the babies, and the location where the tree had been. When it comes to birds, you cannot move the nest very from its initial location if you hope for the parents to find it. This caller opted to build a bird house next to the fallen tree in the hopes that the mother would come back. This was a successful reunification! This warms our hearts to know that these baby birds were able to remain wild.




